Their horses are not of any specific breed, but are probably a mix of several breeds. The horses are of several colours.












A horse should not be expected to carry more than 20% of its own body weight. The horse should have weight equally distributed on the body or/and the same size of load on each side. The heavy items should be placed as low as it can be.



- Over 20% of body weight
- Imbalanced

- Even weight and size distribution




























Normal gums

Gums indicating lung disorders or sepsis


#### Good Conformation




A horse with good conformation has a well-balanced appearance.
